





Construction Compliance and Enforcement Guidance in the City of Centennial

SEMSWA is required to enforce stormwater and erosion control requirements to protect water quality and comply with state and federal law. This document explains SEMSWA's typical enforcement steps in accordance with SEMSWA's Enforcement Response Plan (ERP), available at www.semswa.org.

Compliance Essentials

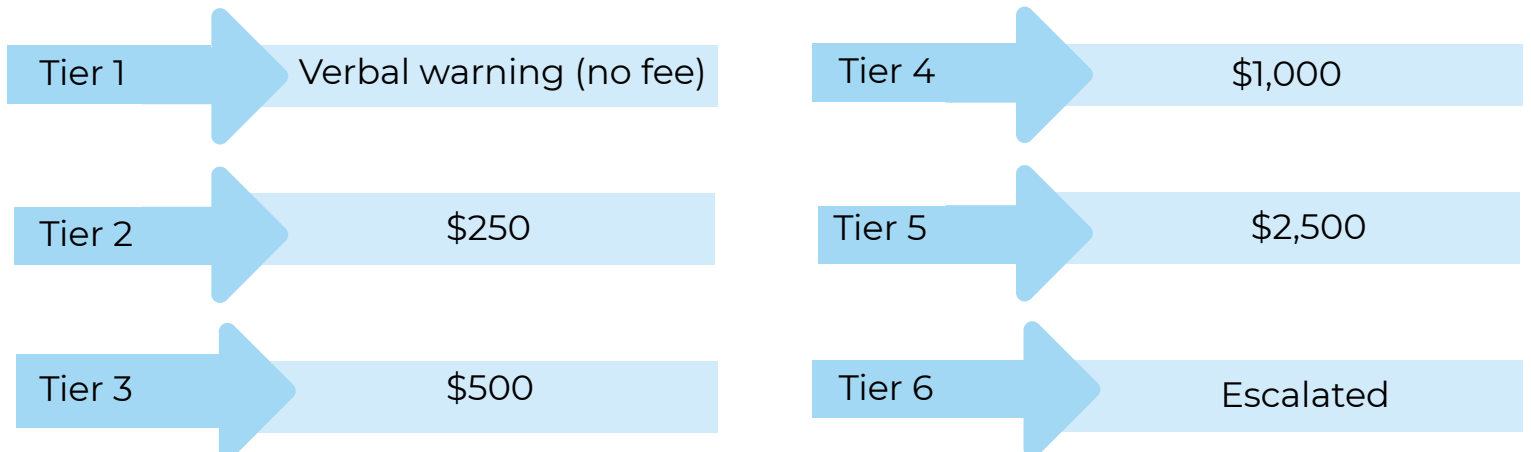
-  Follow your accepted GESC/ESC plan at all times.
-  Maintain records, permits, and plans on the site.
-  Respond immediately to SEMSWA inspection findings.
-  If site conditions change, follow SEMSWA minor or major GESC amendment process.

Common Violations

-  Failure to implement control measures.
-  Inadequate control measures.
-  Failure to maintain control measures.
-  Sediment or mud tracked onto public streets.
-  Discharge of pollutants into storm drains.

The full enforcement process is outlined in the ERP. This process can include noncompliance fees, a hold on certificate of occupancy, Notice of Violation, Compliance Fees, Stop Work Orders, judicial action, and other tools outlined below. Enforcement tiers may be skipped or immediately escalated at inspector's discretion based on severity, quantity, and longevity of findings.
